**\* POLS 7394 – Topical Seminar in International Relations- "Gender and International Relations" - Horn**

This course will address fundamental IR texts from a Feminist IR perspective. Using a broad range of Feminist IR texts, we will explore issues of power, conflict, war, cooperation and diplomacy through a gender perspective. Students will be expected to be familiar with classic IR texts, which will be used throughout the course.

**\*\* POLS 7392 – Topical Seminar in Policy and Administration –“ Building Organizational Social Capital: Informal Networks Within & Between Organizations”- Lazer**

How do our personal networks affect us? How do the networks within and between organizations affect their performance? There has been a dramatic upsurge of interest in social and organizational networks in the last decade, in particular, focused on the idea of organizational social capital: that the ties within and among organizations affect their productivity. This course will provide an overview of the insights from this research, and explore the practical, actionable implications of these findings. The course begins with a set of diagnostics for people to understand their own networks, and concludes with an exploration of how networks affect the collective problem solving capacity of groups and organizations.
